Closing of the Chapter Is Opportunity for Alpha-Delta to Return to PSU in a Few Years Much Stronger than Before

Special Meeting Will Be Scheduled for Alumni to Vote on the Future of the Chapter House

Dear Alpha-Delta Alumni,

As all of you know, our chapter experienced many challenges this past semester, with more to follow. The undergraduate chapter violated several alcohol regulations, ultimately resulting in the charter being revoked. I wanted to provide everybody with an update on what is currently taking place.

The chapter house is now officially closed, except for our commercial tenants on East Beaver Avenue. I am still working on the many details of closing down the house. All the fraternity's assets have been secured and will be properly packed up and stored in the near future. The house has been cleared of all old furniture, trash, etc. (This filled more than seven flatbed construction dumpsters!) We have a local maintenance man who performs house maintenance and ensures the facility is secure, doing several onsite inspections per week.

I am still working with a church group that is interested in renting the building. If this works out, it would give us more time to make a decision on the future of our property. After talking with many alumni, I have found it is the opinion of most that the property should be sold. The board generally agrees with that assessment. However, as per the bylaws, any final decision will be made by a vote at a special meeting for all Alpha-Delta alumni.

In the near future, the board will meet to formally review our options for the house. We will then arrange the special meeting for all alumni. At that meeting we will present the options available to us. We will then have an open discussion for all interested alumni to talk about their questions and concerns. The goal for this meeting will be the final vote on the future of 255 Highland Avenue. Prior to the meeting, a letter will be sent to all alumni with the meeting's details, so that travel arrangements can be made.

Although these are difficult times for all, I also see the great opportunity of having Alpha-Delta return to PSU at some point better than ever. We now have the chance to set our own direction with a new chapter and a new house.

Many chapters around the country have been closed down only to return a few years later much stronger than before. I choose to view our current situation as a great opportunity to have Alpha-Delta return as a premier fraternity in a few years.

It is also important to stress that the lifeblood of our chapter is its alumni. Our alumni communications and events will continue. We will still send out newsletters, have football tailgates and arrange homecoming events. Alpha-Delta has always enjoyed very strong and loyal support from its alumni. That same loyal support will be even more important going forward, in order to ensure we have the necessary resources to continue our work.

From Trinidad to Borneo to Bangkok and Beyond, David Payne Sees the Exotic Corners of the World

Globe-Trotting Businessman Is Specialist in Drilling Oil and Gas Wells

David Payne '81 is a "practical adventurer." He says his goal is to see as much of the world as possible, and he's well on his way. Now in Thailand, he has also lived in California, Louisiana, Trinidad, Borneo, Vietnam and Bangkok. He's not just out exploring, however. He's a husband and father, and it's his job as a driller of oil and gas wells that brought him to exotic locales.

Dave calls Shippensburg, Pa., his hometown, but it was two early years (1968-70) he spent in State College that made up his mind he would attend Penn State. "It was the only university I applied to," he says.

He joined Kappa Sig because he was impressed with the diversity of the men living in the house. "There were a lot of guys I was impressed with personally and, as a group, they could not be put in a mold like with the other fraternities I had visited," he says. His former roommates and Kappa Sig friends include **Bob Burkhardt '81, Pete Giuliani '82, Jim France '82, Mark Rippey '81, Jeff Berdis '81 and Tom Enagonio '84**. Despite the distances, he's tried to stay in touch with most.

"The friends I made in the fraternity are still the best I will ever have," he says. "I can make contact with them after years and years, and it's like we never missed a day."

He recalls fondly the nights of playing pinochle after dinner, bouncing kegs across Beaver Avenue and all the road trips. "I will never forget spending a night in a gas station in New York after my car broke down on the way home from a pledge trip to Cornell," he says. "And how could I forget how much fun we had playing Tales? We won the Tales tournament at ATO one year."

Dave spent 12 years in California after graduating from Penn State. When he left, with a wife and three kids, he moved to Trinidad for two years. "That was one of the best places I have ever lived," he says. "Lots of fun, great people, beaches, fishing, hiking — just about anything you could ask for."

From Trinidad, it was off to Lafayette, La., for four months, and then to Balikpapan, Indonesia, on the east coast of Borneo. "Borneo was a pretty cool place to live when my kids were small," he says. The family lived in a camp and got out a lot to go fishing, diving and mountain biking.

He landed his first management job in 1999 with Unocal in Vietnam, where he stayed for three years. "The Vietnamese are great people and the hardest workers I have ever seen," Dave says.

In 2002, Unocal sent him to Bangkok, where he remains today. "I went from managing five people and a \$12 million budget to 150 people and a \$350 million budget," he says. "It scared the hell out of me!"

electricity needs," Dave explains. "It is really cool to work somewhere and know that what you do really matters to the people around you." He also derives satisfaction from the knowledge that he is able to train local engineers in ways the Thai companies could not.

Dave enjoys living in Thailand outside the office as well. "There is great golf,

fishing and diving," he notes. "Just last weekend I was offshore in the Andaman Sea, swimming with huge manta rays close enough to touch. The islands are spectacular, and the people are absolutely wonderful. Thailand truly is the land of smiles."

Dave also tries to give back to the Thai community he loves so much. "I have participated in Habitat for Humanity projects in central Thailand and helped rebuild a community north of Phuket after the tsunami," he says. "My son raised money to build two long-tail boats to give to fishermen who lost theirs in the tsunami. I've also been coaching a girls' fast-pitch softball team for four years that includes local girls who speak no English. That is always quite an experience!"

Dave stays active and has a love of trying new things. During his time in Asia, he has learned to dive and mountain bike, and he's improved his golf game "from an almost infinite number," he says, to a 12 handicap.

"I learned a lot about people, organization and management from my three years in Kappa Sig. I have had some tough jobs but none as tough as being the house caterer and the GM."

He's setting his sights on Africa next, and he'd like to work somewhere in South America before he retires, in a little under 10 years. "I don't plan to fully stop working but hopefully will be able to consult when there are no college football games to go see," he says.

Dave notes that his travels have given him perspectives that he would not have had otherwise — something he also gained from his Kappa Sigma experience. "I learned a lot about people, organization and management from my three years in Kappa Sig," he says. "What I learned there has helped me in my career. I have had some tough jobs but none as tough as being the house caterer and the GM."

Dave has been married for 21 years. One of his sons is a sophomore at California State at Monterey Bay, and the other is a freshman at Penn State in The Behrend College. His daughter is a senior at the International School in Bangkok. Dave is hoping she will attend Penn State.

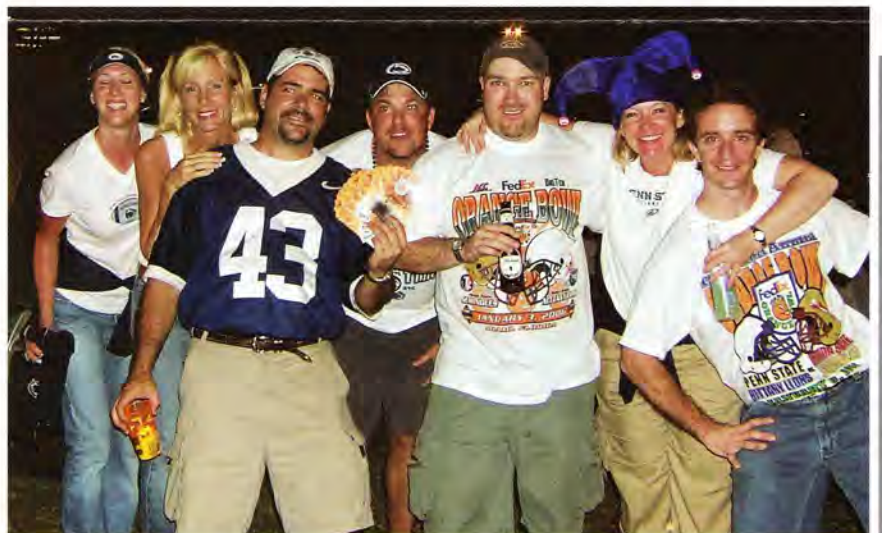

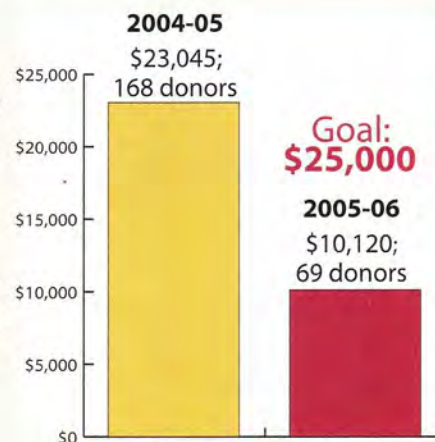
