

In memory of Curtis Edward Mitchell '87

A BIG DOG AMONG BROTHERS

If you were lucky enough to pledge Kappa Sigma in the spring of 1987, you knew Curtis Edward Mitchell. And if you didn't know him, you probably heard him blurt out "Big Dog... walking down the street!" for no apparent reason, stopping conversations cold and leaving everyone in stitches. It was classic Curt: spontaneous, hilarious, and always the spark in the room.

Curt passed away August 9, 2025, and while the news hit hard, it also stirred up a flood of memories from a time when life was simpler, louder, and full of promise. He was more than a pledge brother. He was the kind of guy who made the grind bearable and the good times unforgettable.

We pledged together in the trenches of spring '87, our pledge crew quickly became inseparable. Our bond was forged in the fire of party room cleanups, house chores, Friday-night case-studies at the Skellar, and the occasional "what-were-we-thinking" road trip like our infamous bolt to West Virginia. There was a big hill. There was a flag. There was a Phi Sig party. The rest is classified.

Curt and I once loaded 13 kegs into my beat-up El Camino from Nittany Beverage, a feat of engineering and optimism that defied both physics and Pennsylvania driving laws. He wasn't afraid of hard work and was always in the middle of different Kappa Sig activities. Whether it was the Dance Marathon, the Phi Si 500, or tailgating before a Penn State football game, Curt showed up with energy, heart, and usually some kind of gadget or toy he was excited to show off.

I remember one Friday afternoon as we were making our way to Cafe 210, Curt found a \$100 bill on the sidewalk. Most of us would've pocketed it and kept quiet. Not Curt. He turned it into the first few rounds of drinks for the whole crew, laughing like we'd all won the lottery. Curt was generous to a fault, always ready to celebrate life, and never too busy to lift someone else's spirits.

To be clear though, it wasn't all parties and punchlines. Curt was a solid student, a loyal friend, and someone who genuinely cared about the future. He'd drop whatever he was doing to help a brother out, and he approached every task, no matter how grimy or difficult, with a kind of joy that made you want to pitch in too. He found excitement in the work, pride in the effort, and meaning in the friendships we built. Everyone remembers his smile because it was contagious.

Curt loved his toys, but more than that, he loved the people around him. He lived with curiosity, humor, and a quiet courage that made you feel lucky to know him. He was the guy who made the hard stuff easier and the good stuff even better. We'll miss him deeply, but we'll remember the laughter, the loyalty, and the legacy of a brother who walked through life with heart, humor, and a hell of a stride.

Here's to you, Curt. You set a great example for all of us to follow.
